WHEREAS, the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act, 116 Public Law 136, (the CARES Act) was signed into law by the President of the United States on March 27, 2020; and

WHEREAS, the Ohio General Assembly established a process for distributing funds provided by the "Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act" in House Bill 481 of the 133rd General Assembly (HB 481); and



<u>UPDATE FROM GEAUGA COUNTY HEALTH COMMISSIONER TOM QUADE</u>


Mr. Quade presented some information to the Board and explained that he would be glad to come in and provide updates. Mr. Quade noted that Geauga County is in pretty good shape especially relative to Ohio and to the Country as a whole. There are some trends that are interesting and we need to pay attention to.




Mr. Quade talked about the trend in age distribution of cases, the most common explanation can be tied to environmental change, using June as when the reopening started. Mr. Quade noted

that in Geauga County we are not testing as much as the country as a whole, but more of an increase from those going out to restaurants and bars. Mr. Quade stated that almost all the mortality is in the aging population with the exposure in April and May in the assisted and nursing home (congregate) settings. Mr. Quade explained his concern with sending the kids back to school because in essence it's a congregate setting and even with the best plans it's a numbers game and the plans reduce the risk. Mr. Quade spent most of the summer working with the schools working with their plans. Mr. Quade went over the trends in the first chart, that are listed by age group and expressed concern over the increases in the younger age groups and the arrows are trending upward, adding that we really want all the arrows trending down. Mr. Quade briefly explained how the data is being reported and that it has lag time, including mortality, because the death has to be confirmed as COVID before reported on the death certificate. Mr. Quade stated that there is a gray area on the Ohio Department of Health website because of the lag in the reporting. Mr. Quade stated that not only cases, but hospitalizations and deaths are declining, but unfortunately, we have had 3 reported deaths.


Mr. Quade stated that he went back five years and looked at the causes of death to compare with the deaths for COVID and if you compare them, COVID is the leading cause of death in Geauga County. Mr. Quade stated that there is a lot of comparison of COVID to the Flu, so if you combine Influenza and Pneumonia account for about 2 people a month. Mr. Quade briefly explained how deaths are listed on a death certificate, what determines the cause of death and who completes that information.








Mr. Quade briefly talked about the Risk Assessment Indicators from the State, noting that Geauga County has mainly been yellow with a few bumps up to orange. They are paying attention overall to the State because eventually what is happening elsewhere can catch up to us here. Mr. Quade stated that the trend we will probably hit is indicator #3 which is the indicator of community spread, based on it spreading in the non-congregate settings.



Mr. Lennon brought up that decisions are being made and there are a lot of discrepancy in reporting to which Mr. Quade stated that the data comes from the lab, the hospitals use a separate reporting list. Mr. Lennon stated that he wished there were more accurate numbers being reported and truly seeing the whole picture. Mr. Quade expressed that in public health they focus on prevention, they are trying to stay ahead, and there a lot of do this, take a step back, try this, take a step back. Mr. Quade explained what he has been trying to do when someone calls and asks if they can do something, they talk things through and discuss ways to do things to remain safe. Mr. Quade stated that Geauga County Health has given no action against anyone, business or individual. Mr. Quade stated that they want business to be successful and kids to be educated. Mr. Quade explained that he has been working with the school superintendents about the kids going back to school, the kids playing sports but those things present a great risk and expect to see an increase in cases.

Mr. Quade stated that a big concern they are seeing in Geauga County, but other counties are experiencing similar instances where there are parents out there that don't believe in COVID and people don't want to participate in the contact tracing, which can result in the risk of exposure and transmission without others not knowing. Mr. Quade talked about what is considered being recovered from the illness.

Geauga County is within 1 standard deviation below the mean number of cases per 100,000 population (762). We are not statistically significantly different from the other counties in the region. However, we are 34% lower than the cases per 100,000 for the region as a whole.

Geauga County is within 1 standard deviation below the mean number of hospitalizations per 100,000 population (121). We are not statistically significantly different from the other counties in the region. However, we are 66% lower than the hospitalizations per 100,000 for the region as a whole.

Geauga County is within 1 standard deviation below the mean number of deaths per 100,000 population (51.3). We are not statistically significantly different from the other counties in the region. However, we are 3% higher than the deaths per 100,000 for the region as a whole.

Mr. Quade explained that he has been working closely with the schools and explained his plan to handle contract tracing with any cases that may come up in the schools. Mr. Quade stated that he wished we had the access to test like everyone in the state, but we just can't do that. Mr. Dvorak inquired about business visits within the County, to which Mr. Quade stated that the calls and emails he receives in a day are split, half are upset that people aren't wearing masks and the other half are upset and want things opened up. Mr. Quade stated that if a business installs a policy to visit their establishment and you don't follow it, then that is trespassing. Mr. Quade expressed that cold and flu symptoms overlap the COVID symptoms and if your kid is sick stay home until all the symptoms are gone. If the child is sick and they stay home and they get worse than they test positive by staying home they reduce the transmission to others in the school. Two ways they show up, a positive test by a lab, the other is a close contact of that individual and become symptomatic.

Mr. Lennon inquired about people that believe that they had it early on even before March and any built up immunity. Mr. Quade talked about immunity and herd immunity, and best guess is that 1% of the population has been diagnosed and maybe we could expect that 8 to 10% has actually, had it (best guess). Mr. Quade noted that we have a lot of what if's, herd immunity is often talked about with vaccines, and at some point, we will have one for COVID, and there is a lot of the population that says no thanks, and he himself is not sure of this vaccine and if he will get it. And will there be a need for a booster, like tetanus, we don't know. Mr. Quade stated that each year the flu vaccine is a new strain the vaccine fights previous strains you may come in contact with. The benefit of a covid vaccine over a flu vaccine is that the coronavirus as far as anyone know is not changing to build up herd immunity. Most diseases have an 60-95% immunity.

The Commissioners thanked Mr. Quade for coming in and discussed a follow up in Mid-October. Mr. Dvorak asked that the conference calls be reinstated to keep the lines of communication open. There was a brief discussion on the statistics on the fairs that happened in the state.

Local resident Fred Demming asked if the information presented was going to be made available And Mr. Quade responded that he had prepared to be made a public record. Mr. Demming inquired if Mr. Quade had reviewed the information he received from him at the Junior Fair meeting. Mr. Quade noted that the Governor of Ohio did not close fairs but ordered them to only be allowed to hold a Junior Fair. There was discussion about what the Fair Board will and won't be allowed to do while holding that Junior Fair.

A local resident from Munson, Paul Maguchin express that the Health Commissioner cannot infer the Governors orders and that constitutionally the Governor cannot do what he is doing and that information needs to be presented so that they don't scare people. Mr. Lennon addressed Mr. Maguchin that the plans for the Fair had been gone over at a meeting and if the Governor had not put the order out, the Fair Board would have moved forward with a full Fair, and that he is really just asking for Mr. Quade of his opinion. Mr. Quade briefly described how the Health District is governed by the Board of Health and a Health District Advisory Board and that this process was created after the Pandemic of 1918.
