WHEREAS, Geauga County recognizes its responsibility under the laws of the State of Ohio and the United States of America to provide legal counsel for indigent individuals charged with serious offenses in the Courts of Geauga County; and

WHEREAS, the County Commissioners of Geauga County have chosen to establish a County Public Defender Commission under the authority of the Ohio Revised Code (ORC) Section 120.13; and

WHEREAS, the county public defender shall provide legal representation to indigent adults and juveniles per ORC section 120.16; and

WHEREAS, A court may also appoint counsel and an indigent person may select their own personal counsel in accordance with ORC section 120.16 (E); and

WHEREAS, ORC section 120.33 permits a Board of County Commissioners to adopt a resolution to establish payment to appointed counsel;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of County Commissioners of Geauga County Ohio:

The following fees shall be payable by the County for appointed counsel for work performed on or after February 1, 2022:

- 1. For trial level cases, not involving a death penalty specification, the appointed counsel shall be paid at the rate of \$75.00 per hour, in accordance with the State Public Defender's state maximum fee schedule for appointed counsel reimbursement (revised January 2019).
- 2. The Board further adopts the State Maximum Fee Schedule for Appointed Counsel as promulgated by the Ohio Public Defender in the latest revision dated January 2019. A copy of said schedule is attached and incorporated hereto as Exhibit A, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Clerk of the Geauga County Commissioners is hereby instructed to transmit one original copy of this resolution to Timothy Young, Ohio Public Defender and to each Judge of the Common Pleas Court and the Juvenile/Probate Court of Geauga County, Chardon Municipal Court Judge, and the Geauga County Bar Association.

Exhibit A

STATE MAXIMUM FEE SCHEDULE FOR APPOINTED COUNSEL REIMBURSEMENT

A. General provisions

1. The Ohio Public Defender State Maximum Fee Schedule for Appointed Counsel Reimbursement contains the hourly rates and maximum amounts the OPD will reimburse counties for representation of indigent persons in criminal cases.

- 2. Pursuant to R.C. 120.33(A)(3), to receive reimbursement, a board of county commissioners must adopt a resolution to pay counsel appointed by the court, and must establish a fee schedule. The county is responsible for filing an up-to-date fee schedule with the OPD. Reimbursement will be based on the latest fee schedule filed with the OPD.
- 3. Reimbursement to the counties shall be based on the most serious offense with which the defendant is charged and will be made pursuant to either the State or county rate, whichever is lower. Reimbursement shall not exceed the established hourly or maximum rates unless otherwise provided for by statute, and will be made pursuant to R.C. 120.33 and R.C. 120.34. B.

B. Trial Level Proceedings

- 1. Reimbursement for representation in trial level cases not involving a death penalty specification will be made based on the maximum rate of \$75.00 per hour for both in-court and out-of-court services.
- 2. Reimbursement for representation in trial level cases involving a death penalty specification will be made based on the maximum rate of \$125.00 per hour for both incourt and out-of-court services.
- 3. The prescribed maximum fees permitted in trial level proceedings are:

Reimbursement for guilty or no contest pleas will be made based on the maximum rate of \$75.00 per hour for both in-court and out-of-court services, up to the prescribed maximums for each classification, or if selected by the board of commissioners, at a flat rate for non-homicide felonies, misdemeanors, and juvenile proceedings.

C. Juvenile proceedings

- 1. Reimbursement for representation in juvenile proceedings will be made based on the maximum rate of \$75.00 per hour for both in-court and out-of-court services.
- 2. Reimbursement will not be made for non-attorneys appointed as a guardian ad litem.
- 3. In abuse, dependency, and neglect cases, both the attorney and the guardian ad litem may bill up to the maximum fee allowed by the county for the initial dispositional hearing and each subsequent annual review hearing before the court.

PUBLIC COMMENT

Resident Skip Claypool expressed concern over the recent NOACA meeting and the impact that the immense amount of funding being spent by the Federal government and the impact on the national debt, but all the comments are about Cleveland, and NOACA represents five counties, and everything was all about Cleveland, not even about Cuyahoga County. Mr. Claypool would like to make a proposal to the Board regarding leaving NOACA, and that it makes sense financially to do that, because staying there is making a negative impact on Geauga County.

Another resident Katie Claypool, who indicated there was no relation to Skip Claypool, expressed concern about NOACA and the agency, noting that at the beginning of the meeting that several people where there speaking about an international approach to their focus or how they want to spend the Federal funding, taking away the local control. Mr. Claypool added that the funding is set up for roads and bridges, but they recognized that the scope for NOACA is being forced into areas that they don't need to be involved with. Ms. Claypool added that growing globally is not economical, and that their focus is not local.

Commissioner Spidalieri added that if we could get out tomorrow, he would, but they need to be in an MPO, noting that they are looking into options. Mr. Spidalieri noted that Lake County has concern over the funding they received for Vroom Road project. Mr. Spidalieri noted that he changed his alternate this year to Dr. Oluic from Water Resources because of the focus on Water and Sewer infrastructure.

Mr. Claypool asked for approval to sit with Mr. Morgan and go over a plan to get out of NOACA.

HEALTH DISTRICT

Interim Administrator Adam Litke explained that they had a board meeting coming up and the Board was close to deciding on the Health Commissioner, that they were still running vaccine clinics.
