COMMISSIONERS OFFICE - COUNTY ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT

County Administrator Gerard Morgan reported on the items approved by the County Administrator on March 3, 2022 that included concurring with the Bainbridge Township Trustees in not requesting a hearing on the Liquor License being requested by ARDZ 2, Incorporated located at 17800 Chillicothe Road, Suite 108B, Bainbridge, Ohio (C NEW 0258199-0005) and for Water Resources approved hiring Joshua Smock to the position of Construction Inspector (#2322) at the rate of \$21.17 per hour to be effective March 14, 2022 with a one-year probationary period. This offer of employment is contingent upon the successful completion of the required pre-employment conditions; Approved hiring Gerald Whalen to the position of Design Engineer (#2305) at the rate of \$29.44 per hour to be effective March 21, 2022 with a one-year probationary period. This offer of employment is contingent upon the successful completion of the required pre-employment conditions, and Approved and executed the service Contract Agreement with Harper Well and Pump, Incorporated to perform well and well pump services as needed at various locations within the department for a two-year period, 2022 and 2023 in an amount not to exceed \$10,000.00 (\$5,000.00 per year); as authorized by Resolution #22-004 under the direction and supervision of the County Commissioners that was approved January 4, 2022 pursuant to O.R.C. 305.30.

<u>OSU EXTENSION – 4-H WEEK</u>

Extension Education, 4-H Youth Development, Alisha Faudie thanked the Board for the time this morning to talk about Ohio 4-H week, and that she had brought some 4-H kids with her to talk about what that means, noting that the clubs are sharing their pride about 4-H with displays throughout the County.

Britten Logan, with Sew Sew Sweet 4-H Club started us off with the 4- pledge:

I pledge my head to clearer thinking, my heart to greater loyalty, my hands to larger service, and my health to better living for my club, my community, my country and my world.

The 4-H kids introduced themselves, explaining what club they belonged to and how long they have been in 4-H.

Britten Logan is a member of the Sew Sew Sweet Club and has been in 4-H for 4 years, and joined because she wanted to learn how to sew, and her favorite part is being around the other people in her club.

PJ Graley has been in 4-H for seven years, is a member of the County Coyotes Shooting Sports Club and is a Geauga Trumbull 4-H Camp Counselor for the last year. Mr. Lennon inquired about the Shooting Sports club, to which Mr. Graley explained that it mainly focuses on archery, but once you reach a certain age, you can expand to hand guns, rifles and shot guns. They mainly practice at Great Lakes Outdoor Supply and at Punderson.

Samantha Bergansky has been a member for ten years in the Greener Fields 4-H Club, starting with a rabbit and now has moved into the market animals.

Megan Pleva has been in 4-H for six years and is a member of the Sew Sew Sweet and Flockmasters Clubs.

Ben Pleva is a member of the Flockmasters 4-H Club and has been a member for six years, it has taught him great responsibility in taking care of animals. Mr. Lennon asked him what his

favorite part is, to which he replied, it is making sure they stay alive.

Jacob Thompson is a member of the Feathers and Fleece 4-H Club and has been a member for 8 years, currently at home they have chickens and ducks.

Mr. Dvorak asked the 4-H kids what the most important nutrient is for their animals? Water

Mr. Dvorak asked what they do to market their animals? Ms. Bergansky explained that she likes to talk to people, it's more a hands-on approach, thank people for bidding even if they don't win the animal, and send letters out. Mr. Dvorak added that he feels 4-H is the greatest small business in the county, having to learn expenses, care of the animal, budgeting and the sale.

Mr. Thompson thanked the Board for allowing them to express what value 4-H has brought to their life, for him it's opportunity, the opportunities to learn new skills and improve existing ones, hands on experiences through our animals, the opportunity to learn things to help him in the future, like public speaking and participation. That his word means something, that at club meetings and like today, pledged his allegiance to our republic and its flag, like in the 4-H pledge my hand, head, heart and health to others and to make the best better.

Mr. Thompson spoke about the opportunities they have through community projects and fundraising, along with learning opportunities through presentations, field trips, helping others and is all shown and celebrated at the Great Geauga County Fair, giving him great pride and satisfaction to his project finished and presented. Mr. Thompson was able to represent Geauga County last year at the Ohio State Fair, winning the Clock Trophy for his creative costumes project. It goes beyond practical Community service, it is bringing up the next generation of citizens, preparing us for service, to be caring and productive members of society. Thank you for you continued support and for the opportunities it gives to us all.

Ben Pleva has been in 4-H since he was seven years old, is a member of the Flock Masters, following his brother Sam, currently in college who was in 4-H along with his mom and uncle. Mr. Pleva has learned what the 4-H pledge means, that his head is activity engaged in learning skills to help him later in life, my heart is loyal and helps others, my hands help my community, and my health is important as he wants to age well and be active. Taking care of animals has given him great responsibility and will help him in the future.

Ms. Berganski thanked the Board for allowing them to be there, she started 4-H at the age of seven with a small little bunny that has turned in many other larger projects. Ms. Berganski thanked 4-H for opening their arms to the once scared 7-year-old girl that has taught her to lead a group, to grow up and continue to teach her time management. Ms. Berganski has learned how to give back to the community through volunteering, and her projects have taught her how to deal with problems, and that her projects have taught her how to represent herself, by stepping out of your comfort zone and be the best you can. Ms. Berganski thanked the Board for their continued support.

Mr. Graley explained why 4-H is important in his life, explaining that when he was nine years old, his mom had learned about the Coyote Club being a shooting sport club and asked him if he wanted to join. Since joining seven years ago, it has given him the opportunity to meet new friends and learned about the Geauga Trumbull Camp. Mr. Graley stated that being a part of this club has really pushed him outside of his comfort zone, getting him to be more of an outdoor person, and the opportunities it has opened up for him.

Ms. Faudie presented a token of appreciation to the Board. Commissioner Spidalieri expressed that he is always humbled by what 4-H does, and it's not just the kids, it's also the parents, that it is a big commitment on all sides. The value of 4-H is incredible, it teaches so much, builds character, and exposes them to more opportunity. Mr. Lennon added that it renews his faith in humanity and the next generation. Mr. Dvorak added that 4-H kids are the future leaders.

RESOLUTION RECOGNIZING 4-H WEEK IN GEAUGA COUNTY MARCH 6 – MARCH 12, 2022

WHEREAS, 4-H began in Ohio, back in January 1902, in Clark County, when Albert Belmont Graham organized a meeting for boys and girls as a way to learn more about harvesting corn, planting a garden, testing soils, tying knots and identifying wildlife like weeds and insects, eventually becoming an "Agricultural Club"; and

WHEREAS, the first "Agriculture Club" in Geauga County was held in Thompson Township, with twenty-seven members and they met to discuss corn and tomato crops; and

WHEREAS, in 1914 Geauga County had its first sponsored clubs, with corn for boys and tomato's for girls, ten years later in 1924 seven townships organized seven clubs with a focus on poultry, calves, canning and clothing projects, in 1929 they organized the first forestry club. In 1938 they had the first Junior Fair Board and by 1939 there were fifty (50) clubs with 745 members; and

WHEREAS, the first 4-H camp was held in 1928 on the Grand River in Ashtabula County, and in 1948 Camp Whitewood was established by county agents in Geauga and Ashtabula; and

WHEREAS, 4-H in Geauga County in 2021 was represented across thirty-two (32) clubs with 671 members, 139 volunteers helped oversee the clubs and assisted at camp, there were eleven educational clinics held, and 112 4-H club members were able to attend Camp; and

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Geauga County Board of Commissioners hereby recognize and celebrate 4-H week in Geauga County, and Ohio, March 6 through March 12, 2022; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this Resolution becomes part of the permanent record of the Board of Commissioners of Geauga County, Ohio.
