WHEREAS, on August 27, 2019, this Board adopted Resolution No. 19-102 declaring it necessary to construct sanitary sewers to provide sanitary sewer service to properties located in the Berkshire Heights Subdivision, Chardon Township in the Geauga County Sanitary Sewer District, also known as the Chardon Township Wastewater Treatment Plant and Sewers Project (the Project); and

WHEREAS, on February 24, 2022, this Board adopted Resolution No. 22-020 declaring the final assessment amount to be \$3,164,000.00 for the cost of constructing the project, setting a 30 day period from the adoption of Resolution #22-020 for property owners to pay all or a part of the amount assessed, and that any amounts not paid within the 30 days to be certified to the County Auditor as provided by law to be placed on the tax list; and

WHEREAS, the Board has chosen to provide additional time to review other possible sources of funding, namely funds from the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (ARPA);

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of County Commissioners of Geauga County, Ohio, that:

<u>Section 1</u>. The timeline for the amount assessed against any parcel of land may be paid in whole or in part in cash or by check is extended from the original set time of the close of business 30 days after the adoption of this resolution (March 28, 2022) to the close of business 60 days after the adoption of Resolution No. 22-020 (April 19, 2022).

<u>Section 2</u>. All assessments and installments thereof remaining unpaid at the expiration of the period referred to in the preceding Section 1 shall be certified to the County Auditor as provided by law to be placed on the tax list and duplicate and collected as other taxes are collected in 60 semi-annual installments, with 1.85% interest.

<u>Section 3</u>. The Clerk of this Board is hereby directed to forward a certified copy of this resolution to the County Auditor within twenty days after its adoption.

<u>Section 4</u>. This Board finds and determines that all formal actions of this Board and of any of its committees concerning and relating to the adoption of this resolution were taken, and that all deliberations of this Board and of any of its committees that resulted in those formal actions were held, in meetings open to the public in compliance with the law.

Mr. Morgan explained that he has looked again into the ARPA funding guidelines and there are a few requirements that may exclude this project from us; including the requirement for Federal Procurement and the costs being expended prior to a March 1 2021 date. Mr. Morgan sent another request to the Prosecutor's Office for legal review and is part of the reason for the extension so there is time to allow for a response.

<u>PUBLIC COMMENT</u>

Mike Valko, a resident from Berkshire Heights asked for a clarification on the date of March 2021 and why does this effect the distribution of the funds. Mr. Morgan stated that in the ARPA rules it says funds expended after March 2021 and when they were appropriated, as this project was started well before ARPA funds. Mr. Valko asked about an evening meeting, to which Mr. Morgan stated that they will put together a meeting once they heard back from the Prosecutor's Office. The meeting will be noticed like a regular meeting and a letter will be sent to the residents.

Jim Laudato stated that in 2022 there is about \$3 million dollars appropriated for the Chardon Township treatment plant, is that different from what you are talking about. Mr. Morgan stated that March 2021 is in the ARPA rules and for funds expended after that date. Mr. Laudato asked if the Board was appropriating \$3.1 million to the project, to which it was noted that the money appropriated in the budget is not ARPA funds. Mr. Laudato asked why they asked for the ARPA funds, to which it was noted that the funding was allocated to counties, they just had to request

the funding to be received and can be used for other projects. Mr. Laudato asked what the other projects were, to which Mr. Lennon stated that there has not been any decisions made on how the funds will be spent, the requests have been received by the Commissioners and have included from the hospitals, through phone call and emails. Mr. Laudato expressed that the residents of the Berkshire Heights subdivision didn't ask for a \$54,000.00 bill for a sewer project, so these residents can use the money. Mr. Laudato explained his simple math for the assessment, and ask where has the effort been for assistance for the residents. Mr. Lennon stated that there was a grant of \$500,000.00 that was received on the project, but it didn't qualify for any others. A loan was secured for the project.

Mr. Lennon expressed that all 88 counties received funding, and there are rules for how to spend the ARPA funds. Mr. Morgan explained that the County requested the funds, there has been no determination of how to spend the funds, this project was started well before the ARPA funds were allocated. Mr. Laudato expressed his frustration and asked where the minutes are for 2022. Clerk, Christine Blair stated that they were sent to the HelpDesk and was waiting for them to be uploaded.

Mr. Morgan again stated that the ARPA funding requires that a project must follow Federal Procurement regulations and this project did not follow those Federal Procurement rules. Mr. Morgan noted that we have been warned about requests for Broadband as there are projects that are receiving separate funding for those projects and to not use the county ARPA funds on them. Mr. Laudato wanted to know if this project compares to other projects that have been assessed. There are other assessments out there, and they did average about \$1,000 a year on the property. Mr. Laudato expressed that he is looking for fairness and for someone to help them find some money. Mr. Morgan stated that Water Resources does not get funding from the General Fund, they are an enterprise fund.

Resident, Chuck DiCillo expressed that the Probate Court gave the Board the perfect vehicle to give the residents these funds, the Board didn't like that verdict and ruling and appealed it. Mr. Morgan stated that they appealed the wrong decision by the lower court, due to the court not following the law that was out there and why it was overturned and the Probate Court does not have the authority to authorize us to ignore all the other rules in ARPA. The Appellate Court stated that the Probate Court did not follow the requirements of the ORC. Mr. Morgan stated that in Mr. DiCillo's thinking the taxpayers of Geauga County would pay for this.

Mr. Valko asked for confirmation of dates on ARPA funding. Mr. Morgan stated that the ARPA funds were made available in April and were received in June / July / August 2021. Mr. Valko stated that from August to March the funds were siting there and nothing was brought up until the meeting in March. Mr. Morgan stated that the rules in ARPA are for expenses after March 2021.

A resident asked about the road repair and the chip and seal that was done. The road was repaired during the project and the Township does the chip and seal. The resident asked if the ARPA funds could be used to repair the road.

Mr. Dvorak explained that the Township asked about using ARPA funds to assist the residents and the Prosecutor's office opinion to the Township was that it doesn't follow their normal basic business. Township Trustee Strazinsky stated that the Township received about \$445,000.00.

Mr. Laudato asked if it is customary for the implementation of a treatment plant to be completely funded by the residents. Mr. Morgan stated yes, except for the portion that Water Resources takes on or grant money cannot be obtained. Water Resources applies to the funding sources in the State. Mr. Morgan explained that they searched for funding and did surveys to try and determine the LMI in the area to try and get funding. Mr. DiCillo noted that Thompson got most of their project funded to which Mr. Morgan stated that was due to the LMI determination in the area. The LMI Studies done in Berkshire Heights did not meet the LMI necessary for the funding sources. It's too late to do any more survey studies.

A resident questioned the time of the project, this originally started with the EPA in 2012/2013 and here we are almost 9 years to complete the project, why was it delayed. Mr. Morgan stated that the orders were received and extensions were requested to try and find funding, to complete the survey studies and the design for construction. The grant and loans were put into place and

the project moved forward, there was a lawsuit that delayed the assessment process and the CORONAVIRUS did not happen until well after this project was under construction.

A resident questioned a rumor of condo's going in on Auburn and if they tied into the system and do they pay it and will it reduce our fees. Mr. Morgan stated that they would have to pay for the costs to increase the capacity plant size and the cost to tie in, the residents would not be assessed for that cost. There are a lot of rumors going around about condo's and homes on the Golf Course, but that is what they are, rumors. A resident asked if something did happen would there be a re-assessment done for all the residents, to which Mr. Morgan stated that he couldn't speak to a hypothetical.

A resident asked if anyone thought it was unconstitutional and being forced into a new sewer system. Mr. Laudato expressed that he thought it was interesting that this was to fix a public health problem and causing a public health problem, asking Mr. Morgan to help them, to give them his best and help them. A resident asked who signed the loan papers, that she didn't sign for it. Mr. Morgan stated that the Commissioners signed it in accordance with the O.R.C. Several residents continued expressing their frustrations over the assessment. Mr. DiCillo asked when the Board requested the Prosecutor to look in to the use of the ARPA funds, to which Mr. Lennon stated, last week. Mr. DiCillo continued asked why that hadn't been done a year ago, with them using the funding all along. Mr. Morgan stated that when this project started there was no funding coming, ARPA came well after. Mr. Laudato aggravatedly asked about this not being an emergency and that they can't find the money to help the residents, find a loop hole and give us money, begging for help. A resident asked about someone being out of work for the last two years over the pandemic, that this is what the ARPA funds are for. Commissioner Spidalieri stated that there are help wanted signs posted, if you want a job in this county, everyone is hiring. A resident, who is a nurse, stated that she has been working. Mr. DiCillo stated that in the paperwork they have a six-month tie in period, but according to Ohio law don't we have a year. Mr. Morgan stated that they set a time period of six months, before it gets turned over to the Health Department, and there is a possibility to extend it. Mr. DiCillo continued with the one-year time period, according to the O.R.C., to which Mr. Morgan stated you get six months in accordance with the findings and orders issued from the EPA.
