<u>GEAUGA COUNTY 4-H – RESOLUTION RECOGNIZING 4-H WEEK IN GEAUGA COUNTY</u> Extension Educator, 4-H Youth Development Alisha Faudie explained that each year we like to come and speak with the Board and say thank you for their continued support in the Ohio State Extension and with Geauga County 4-H. Ms. Faudie brought members today who are going to introduce themselves and talk a little about what they do.

Everyone stood and did the 4-H pledge.

Augusta Halle explained that she is in her second year of 4-H, Ride with Pride club and does horses for her project. Ms. Halle explained corn and cattle, before moving to Ohio two years ago from California, she thought Ohio was a big field of corn with animals sprinkled here and there and didn't know what 4-H was, upon joining she was hesitant because she didn't know about farming or livestock and was a bit of a horse girl. First, she learned about the diverse group that 4-H is and while Ohio is filled with fields, her corn assumption was wrong, although it is one of Ohio's largest industry is food and agriculture. Ms. Halle explained that 4-h helped her make friends with a diverse group of people and the outlets it provides for leadership and education, along with real life experiences.

Brady Ross explained that this was his second year in 4-H and is President of his club, Geauga Prime Time, where does Turkeys, Ducks and will be doing a Goat this year. Mr. Ross stated that 4-H has taught him responsibilities, taking care of his animals properly. Mr. Ross thanked the Board for letting 4-H happen.

Daniel Novak is in the GEAR 4-H club – Geauga Engineering and Robotics and is the Vice President in his club. Mr. Novak stated that he joined six years ago, he does robotics. This club has helped him with the career path he would like to take, showing the Board a robot he had built. Mr. Novak thanked the Board for keeping 4-H a living viable program for kids to get into.

Milo Morgan-Ard started 4-H around seven years ago as a Cloverbud and is a member of the Buckeye Showmen and the Totally Dogs 4-H clubs. Mr. Morgan-Ard has raised rabbits, dogs, poultry, goats and pigs. Mr. Morgan-Ard has helped him be a more rounded person in the community, through helping with projects, leadership roles from positions in his club, and things he has learned has helped him with unexpected events. Fair is his favorite part of 4-H.

Tatum Poff explained that she has been in 4-H since she was a cloverbud, about eleven years, but has been involved in 4-H and agricultural industry as part of the sixth generation on the family farm. Ms. Poff is part of the Geauga Beef and Swine and Junior Leaders (Secretary for both), and is also a Junior Fair Board member. Ms. Poff shows cattle at local, state and national level and market chickens at the local county fair. Ms. Poff took part in a STEM project, through the Ohio STEM Challenge. Ms. Poff stated that 4-H has given her opportunities that she might not have been able to do, including the Ohio Farm Bureau new capital challenge, which included creating new policies and present to the state. Ms. Poff express her gratitude to the Board for keeping the 4-H programs going, as it has allowed her to travel to many states, make great memories and the best of friends.

Holly Phillips is in her sixth year in 4-H, is a member of the Feathers and Fleece club, of which she is the President. Ms. Phillips explained that she got started in 4-H by her grandparents, who owned a farm, where advisors and her grandfather was a poultry judge. Ms. Phillips projects include market and fancy chickens, a mentoring project, and this year will be doing a leadership and self-determined project which includes introducing a new breed of chicken that is dual purpose, meat and egg laying. Ms. Phillips explained that 4-H has helped her become more self confident, break out her shell and get out in the community and share her passion for agriculture and 4-H, and in being a part of growing a community that she wants to a part of. 4-H is much

more than animals, agriculture or sewing, it's about making a family in your community.

Taylor Poff is sixteen, a sophomore at Chardon High School, but also takes classes at Lakeland. Ms. Poff has been in 4-H for eleven years, where she showed beef, swine and sheep in Cloverbuds and now her main projects are cattle and chickens. Ms. Poff is a member of the Geauga Beef and Swine 4-H club, where she has been President for the last four years. Ms. Poff is also a member of the Junior Leaders and also President of the club, which are the ones that make the wonderful milkshakes at the Fair. Ms. Poff is also a member of the Junior Fair Board. Ms. Poff explained that she grew up on a farm and is a sixth-generation farmer, so it's something she has always known, and while it has allowed her to travel to many different places, the biggest part is the friendships she has made as they are always there for each other and each other's number one fan. Ms. Poff stated that 4-H has taught her many things, and that it is not always about the showing of animals there is so much more, but will always be thankful for the Board, because without them we wouldn't have the 4-H program we have today.

Ben Stone is a member of the County Coyotes Shooting Sports and archery is his favorite sport.

4-H Advisor Jeanne Jefferson explained that she has been an advisor for 29 years, including having Mr. Dvorak's children. Ms. Jefferson started in 4-H at 9 years old with beef and continued, was Junior Fair Queen in 1989. Ms. Jefferson's son joined 4-H and showed Turkeys and Ducks. Ms. Jefferson talked about market projects and the many things that it teaches you starting from an egg or as a baby and taking it to market, teaching you how to care for something that can't care of itself. Ms. Jeffersons son was the Fair King last year and unfortunately has aged out of 4-H, and keeps getting questioned are you giving it up and the answer is no, she can't, she loves what 4-H teaches kids and watching them grow up, and being apart of that makes her feel good. Her club is Geauga Prime Time and their motto is 4-H is family and family sticks together.

Ms. Faudie presented everyone with a little 4-H token, thanking the Board for their continued support. Commissioner Lennon expressed the importance of what having animals teaches kids, the responsibilities. Ms. Jefferson thanked the Board for always supporting the kids at the livestock show. Mr. Dvorak added that we are in great hands for the future with these kids, and the small business that each of them have and the business mind and compassion for what they have to do.

WHEREAS, 4-H began in Ohio, back in January 1902, in Clark County, when Albert Belmont Graham organized a meeting for boys and girls as a way to learn more about harvesting corn, planting a garden, testing soils, tying knots and identifying wildlife like weeds and insects, eventually becoming an "Agricultural Club"; and

WHEREAS, the first "Agriculture Club" in Geauga County was held in Thompson Township, with twenty-seven members and they met to discuss corn and tomato crops; and

WHEREAS, in 1914 Geauga County had its first sponsored clubs, with corn for boys and tomato's for girls, ten years later in 1924 seven townships organized seven clubs with a focus on poultry, calves, canning and clothing projects, in 1929 they organized the first forestry club. In 1938 they had the first Junior Fair Board and by 1939 there were fifty (50) clubs with 745 members; and

WHEREAS, the first 4-H camp was held in 1928 on the Grand River in Ashtabula County, and in 1948 Camp Whitewood was established by county agents in Geauga and Ashtabula; and

WHEREAS, 4-H in Geauga County in 2022 was represented across thirty-two (32) clubs with 785 members, 120 youth participated in camp (4-H and non-4-H members), 154 youth participated in school enrichment programs (4-H and non-4-H members) and 125 volunteers helped oversee the clubs and assisted at camp; and

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Geauga County Board of Commissioners hereby recognize and celebrate 4-H week in Geauga County, and Ohio, March 8 through March 14, 2023; and
